A MESSAGE FROM THE CHAIR

AND THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

BUILDING A PROTECTIVE COMMUNITY FOR A WORLD FREE OF SEXUAL VIOLENCE



YOUNG PEOPLE ARE AT THE HEART OF OUR SERVICES

In Québec, 53% of sexual assault victims are under the age of 18.1 out of 5 girls and 1 out of 10 boys are sexually assaulted by the age of 18. These are excellent reasons to prioritize providing services to the children and adolescents who are the victims of sexual violence, but also to mobilize the community, partners and decision-makers to build a protective community for our young people.

At the Marie-Vincent Foundation, **children** and teenagers are at the heart of all our services, from prevention to therapy to training. Since they have few opportunities to be heard in the public sphere, we hope to give them a voice and remind everyone how important it is to provide them with high-quality services all across the province.

PREVENTING SEXUAL VIOLENCE

The Marie-Vincent Foundation wants to help reduce the number of young victims. As such, we help prevent sexual violence against young children and teens.

In fact, we are very proud that on May 1, 2019, we officially launched our prevention program for young children age from birth to five.

Over the course of the year, we finalized our tools and rolled them out in our pilot locations: books that convey basic concepts about egalitarian relationships and self-protection skills; a game that helps young children learn that no game should include private parts; a discussion handbook to help facilitate conversations with children; a guide for professionals; and short videos aimed at parents and other adults who spend time with young children. All these tools aim to demonstrate that through simple everyday acts, we can provide education about sexuality and egalitarian relationships, which in the long term helps prevent sexual violence. We would like to thank all the partners who contributed to our thinking about the design of these high-quality tools.

All the professionals in child-care centres, community organizations and schools who took part in the pilot project in the communities of Longueuil and Saint-Ré-



mi in Montérégie, and in the communities of Côte-des-Neiges, Parc-Extension and Lachine in Montréal, were trained to properly use these tools, and to take action and answer children's questions.

We also developed tools for Indigenous communities. They will be available in child- care centres, family organizations and health and social service centres in Manawan, Wemotaci, La Tuque and Natashquan.

These tools are available in the new Prevention section of our website.

Our online sexual violence prevention program is also currently operating in five secondary schools. It was rolled out in two new schools during the school year. Youth committees continue to build awareness-raising campaigns in their schools about online sexual violence.

TREATING VICTIMS OF SEXUAL EXPLOITATION

The Foundation continues to offer therapy services to young victims of sexual violence. As part of the services we provide to teen victims of sexual violence, this year we developed an intervention kit for young victims of sexual exploitation thanks to funding obtained under the Québec government's Stratégie d'action jeunesse (youth action strategy).

TRAINING PROFESSIONALS

The Foundation trains professionals, sharing knowledge and expertise across the province to help children benefit from the best possible services.

This year, we started training professionals in school settings to help better equip them to receive disclosures and work with children who exhibit sexual behaviour problems. This training has proved to be very useful alongside the rollout of the sex education program in all Québec schools.

ROLLING OUT OUR SERVICES

In 2018–2019, we undertook a thinking process and a regional needs analysis in order to deploy our prevention, training and therapy services.

Throughout the coming year, we will work to increase our impact by rolling out our services in various communities, always in collaboration with regional partners as well as with our Interuniversity Chair, which helps us ensure that we base our work on best practices and evaluate our actions.

We aim to grow our protective community to build a world free of sexual violence by always keeping young people at the heart of our priorities and our services.










Every child deserves to live a happy life, to grow up healthy, to thrive and to reach their full potential.




The Foundation is collaborating with a concerted group of engaged partners to:

An intervention kit

for sexual exploitation

Thanks to funding obtained as part of the Stratégie d'action jeunesse (youth action strategy), the Marie-Vincent Foundation team, in collaboration with a number of partners, designed a toolkit for interventions with teens who are, or who are at risk of being, victims of sexual exploitation.

This intervention kit will be used as part of the therapy provided to these young victims. Services

in Montérégie

Services have been provided to children in Châteauguay since July 2018 under an agreement with the CISSS de la Montérégie-Est. As such, families in the region have easier access to the therapy services provided by the Marie-Vincent Foundation.

Between July 1, 2018, and March 31, 2019, 16 children began or completed a course of therapy in Châteauguay.



PREVENTION:

THE LANTERN - AWACIC PROGRAM

The Lantern program is a sexual violence prevention program aimed at preschoolage children and the adults in their lives. It was developed based on the needs of parents, educators and professionals in various settings that serve young children (child-care centres, community organizations, schools, CLSCs and more).

The program provides training and tools that help prevent sexual violence by means of sex education and the promotion of egalitarian relationships. The various tools we completed over the course of the year include books, a game, a discussion handbook, a guide and videos, all tailored to young children's developmental stage.

Since the fall of 2018, the program has been implemented in pilot locations in the Montérégie and Montréal regions, where it has been positively received. Both children and professionals greatly appreciate the tools!



PREVENTION:

NO TO ONLINE SEXUAL VIOLENCE AGAINST YOUNG PEOPLE!

Funded by the Ministère de la Justice du Québec, the project aims to better understand the phenomenon of online sexual violence against young people, in order to determine the best intervention and prevention strategies.

The data collected from more than 900 students and 50 staff members over the two years of the pilot project helped shed light on the prevalence and consequences of online sexual violence in school environments.

Implemented in five schools in the Montréal, Laval and Montérégie regions, the project helped raise awareness about the issue among young people, high school administrations, teachers, professionals and parents.

Within each school, a prevention committee made up of motivated, creative young people took part in developing a concrete, original prevention and action plan to raise awareness about the issue among their peers. We developed tools, including a facilitation guide, to support the creation of youth committees in all interested schools.

To meet needs expressed within school environments, a new range of bilingual services was

developed this year.

It includes training, teaching and intervention videos, support for the development of an internal protocol for responding to cases of sexual violence, and clinical support to help manage the problem situations encountered. A training session helps professionals better distinguish whether sexual behaviours are healthy, worrisome or problematic, and to know how to manage sexual behaviours that don't necessarily need to be referred to specialized external resources.

Another training session helps professionals understand how to listen to disclosures from children who are victims of sexual assault, and know how to react appropriately.

Throughout the year, we provided training for several schools in the Montréal, Laval, Montérégie, Laurentides and Outaouais regions.





The goal of the Chaire interuniversitaire Marie-Vincent is to develop cutting-edge expertise in Québec in the areas of screening and treatment of sexual abuse of children and teens.



PORTRAIT OF A PARTNER:

RENÉ MALO FOUNDATION

WHAT IS THE RENÉ MAIO FOUNDATTON?

The René Malo Foundation is a family foundation created in 1996.

Marie and René Malo, then the parents of two young children, were particularly concerned by the conditions of youth in Québec. Based on the humble desire to help provide kids with equal chances to develop to their full potential, the Foundation's mission was clear from the start.

As such, the René Malo Foundation has two parallel missions that sometimes overlap.

Its first and foremost mission is to provide support for Québec children in their physical, psychological, academic and emotional development, as well as their fulfilment through the arts.

Its second mission is to support the cultural milieu: to help raise the visibility of Québécois art, mainly cinema.

For a decade now, Fanny-Laure and Laurent Emmanuel have helped with decision-making regarding the Foundation's orientations, as well as in selecting which requests for assistance to accept. As such, they were the natural choice for an expanded role; Fanny has held the position of Vice-Chair of the Foundation since 2013.

HOW LONG HAS THE RENE MALO FOUNDATION BEEN INVOLVED WITH MARIE-VINCENT FOUNDATTON?

The first donation from René Malo Foundation to Marie-Vincent Foundation was in 2009. In 2014, after our tour of the Expertise Centre and our meeting with the Executive Director at the time, we decided to support Marie-Vincent's work more substantially and in the longer term. So we've now been involved with Marie-Vincent Foundation for 10 years.

WHAT LED YOU TO GET INVOLVED WITH THE MARTF-VINCENT FOUNDATTON?

The Foundation's Executive Director approached us. After the tour of the Expertise Centre, and especially after meeting with the professionals from the clinical team, we realized the extent to which Marie-Vincent Foundation had exceptional and unique skills in the realm of sexual violence against children. This expertise has only grown, supported by the work of the Chaire interuniversitaire and the prevention programs, in partnership with frontline organizations. What particular-





ly struck us was the explanation that by the end of the therapy process provided to child victims of sexual violence, they return to a "normal" quality of life. To this day, we're hugely inspired by what Marie-Vincent Foundation accomplishes with children.

After that first meeting, we decided to fund Marie-Vincent Foundation in an ongoing way, and to support it to the best of our own expertise. In this regard, we helped it create the "Mon plus grand rêve" ("My greatest dream") short videos, and Fanny served as President of Marie-Vincent Foundation's Young Leaders' Circle in 2017 and 2018. Fanny is still a member of the Circle, and is actively preparing for the third edition of the OMBRÉ event to benefit Marie-Vincent Foundation.

WHAT IS YOUR WISH FOR THE MARTF-VTNCENT FOUNDATTON?

We'd like to see large-scale distribution of the exceptional materials provided within the Lantern program. The Lantern program is a sexual violence prevention tool for young children, and it's the only one of its kind. With this program, we want to significantly reduce the number of cases of sexual violence. We rally in support of Marie-Vincent Foundation's dream, which is to build a world free of sexual violence, and we believe the tools that have been developed are a strong first step in this direction.

Every parent, as soon as their first child is born, should receive these prevention tools.



WHAT IS YOUR GREATEST DREAM For Children?

For them to grow up in a healthy world, with a society that allows them to be carefree during their precious childhood years as they fully develop their emotional and creative skills.

PORTRAIT OF A PARTNER:

NATHALIE LAMOTHE

WHAT IS YOUR ROLE WITH THE CENTRE JEUNESSE DE MONTRÉAL?

I am a manager with the Direction de la protection de la jeunesse (Director of Youth Protection – DYP), within the team responsible for assessing and guiding children for whom a report was deemed justifiable. The assessment and orientation team determines whether the child's safety or development is compromised and chooses what protective measures must be put into place.

My team handles reports of physical and sexual abuse of young people aged from birth to 17 across the whole Island of Montréal. The young people we refer to Marie-Vincent Foundation are victims of sexual abuse or sexual exploitation, but they may also have sexual behaviour problems.

HOW LONG HAVE YOU BEEN WORKING WITH THE MARTE-VINCENT FOUNDATION?

The Centre jeunesse de Montréal has been a Marie-Vincent Foundation partner since the creation of its Expertise Centre in 2006. I took part in developing and implementing the range of services offered to child victims of sexual violence. Since 2007, I've been part of the Marie-Vincent partners' coalition and I've been a member of a number of consulting committees. My team and I have close ties with the Foundation, since we regularly refer children and teens.

HOW HAS THIS COLLABORATION CHANGED YOUR WORK?

With the creation of the Expertise Centre, I was able to build ties with partners from various areas who also work with child victims of sexual violence. I also developed relationships with partners from other regions, such as Laval and Montérégie. We were all able to expand our professional network. We can meet and talk about our work and about developments within our organizations.

Among other things, thanks to this teamwork, we have access to research results from the Chaire interuniversitaire Marie-Vincent and to training. We benefit from cutting-edge knowledge. It's a rich experience for all the partners. The partners' coalition also fosters inter-sectoral work and cohesiveness. We are all working toward the same goal—that of helping children and their families.

As well, the teamwork we do with the psychosocial intervention services for parents (SIPP) is extremely valuable for us. This helps us ensure that the parents receive more intensive services and support that meet their needs during the time when we're assessing the report. Our services have become complementary.

Lastly, I appreciate how the Foundation listens to the partners' needs. Previously, Marie-Vincent provided services to children aged 12 and under only. We wanted teens to also be able to receive therapy



services, since their needs were so intense. Our request was heard, and services are now provided to teens.

WHAT IMPACT HAS THIS COLLABORATION HAD ON YOUNG PEOPLE?

First, I find Marie-Vincent to be one of the places best tailored to the needs of children and teens who are victims of sexual violence. The space, the décor, all reflect the clientele. We also know that the young people will receive top-notch services there.

We've contributed to a few studies, so we know that the services really meet the children's needs.

As well, the partners are all united around the children. We know each other, we work together, and we can discuss cases with colleagues from every sector: police, legal, CLSC (health & social services centres), CAVAC (crime victims assistance centres) and so on.

WHAT IS YOUR WISH FOR HF MARTF-VINCENT FOUNDATION?

My wish would be for the Foundation to always continue to provide services to children and teens who are the victims of sexual violence.

Another wish would be for the services to be able to spread all over Québec, so that all children who need these services can get them. The ideal would always be for as many partners as possible to come together under a single roof.

I would also like for the Marie-Vincent Foundation team to be able to grow, so that all children can receive services with no wait time.

WHAT IS YOUR GREATEST DREAM FOR CHILDREN?

I have several dreams for children! First, I'd like for children and teens to be able to grow up in a world free of mistreatment, free of any kind of violence, and free of sexual violence. I'd like children to be able to grow up in safety and security.

As long as there are young victims, I wish for them to be able to get services at the right time, without waiting. That's crucial.

My dream is also for all the partners to be able to work to prevent sexual violence, and also to treat it. I think sex education for young people is important in preventing sexual violence, and we also need to think about educating and equipping parents.

Sexual violence has consequences for the victims, but also for all of society. It incurs major costs. We need to break the taboos surrounding sexual





















OMBRÉ 2018: OVER \$40,000 FOR MARIE-VINCENT FOUNDATION






